

The activities in this unit cover the period of America's History from 1800-1824. Each activity can be used independently so you may choose those that fit your lesson plans and time schedule.

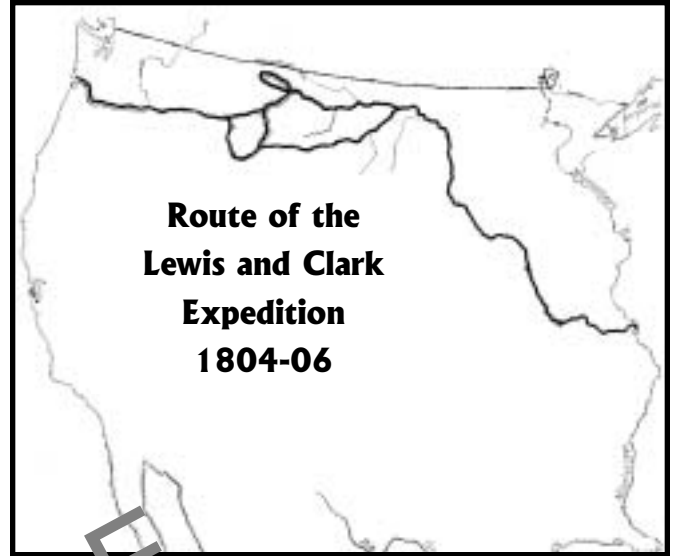

In 1805 there were 17 states in the union. There were 9 free states and 8 slave states.

In 1803, Ohio entered the Union as the 17th state. In 1805, the Michigan Territory was organized.

In 1803, the Jefferson administration purchased the Louisiana Territory from France for \$15million adding 828,000 square miles to the United States. The Lewis and Clark expedition was organized to explore the territory.

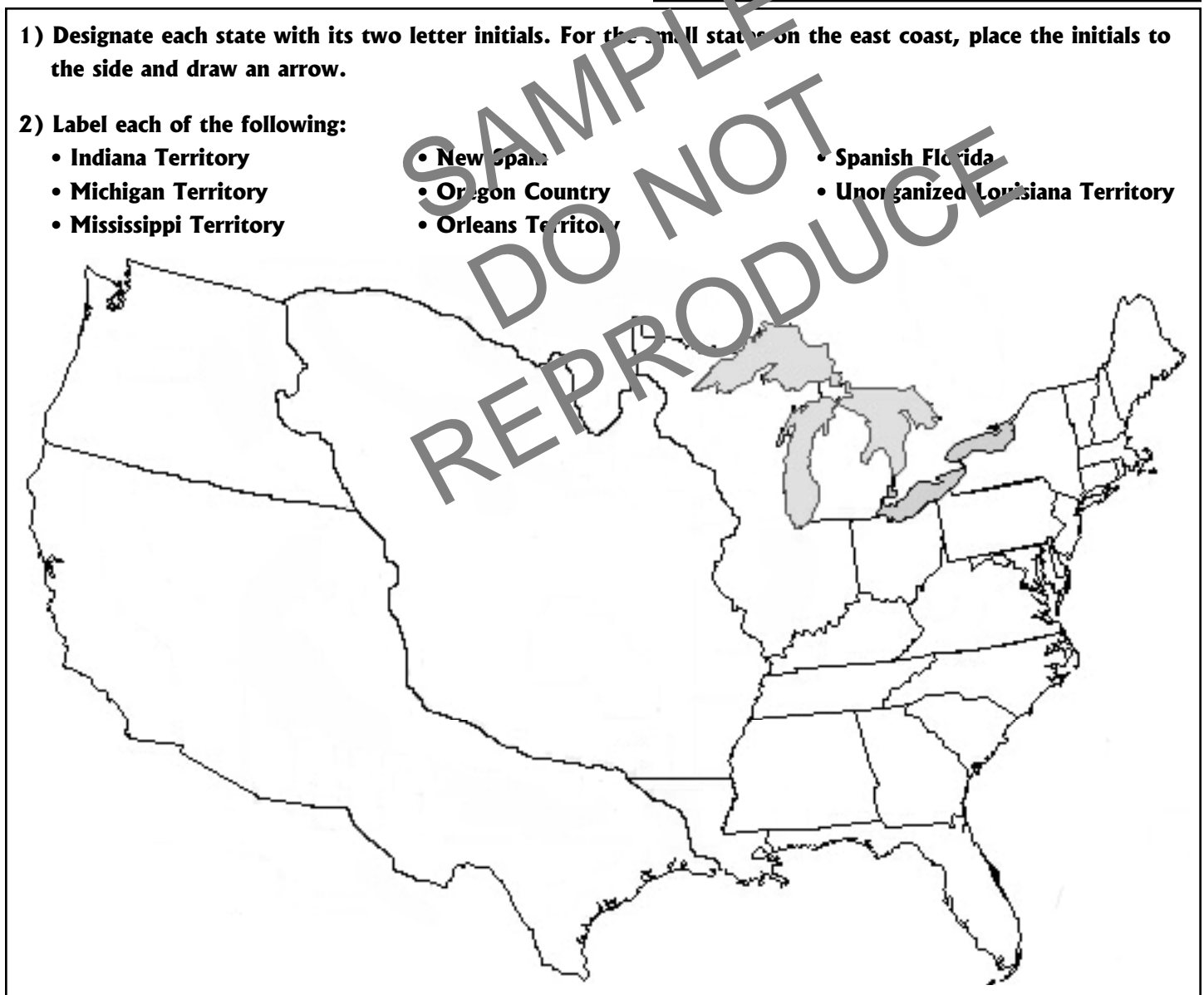
Lewis and Clark left St. Louis in March, 1804 and headed north along the Missouri River. The first winter was spent among the Mandan Indians in the Dakotas. In the spring of 1805, they continued up the Missouri to its headwaters; crossed the eastern slopes of the Rockies and the Continental Divide; and in November, 1805 reached the Pacific Ocean.

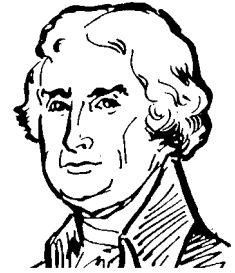

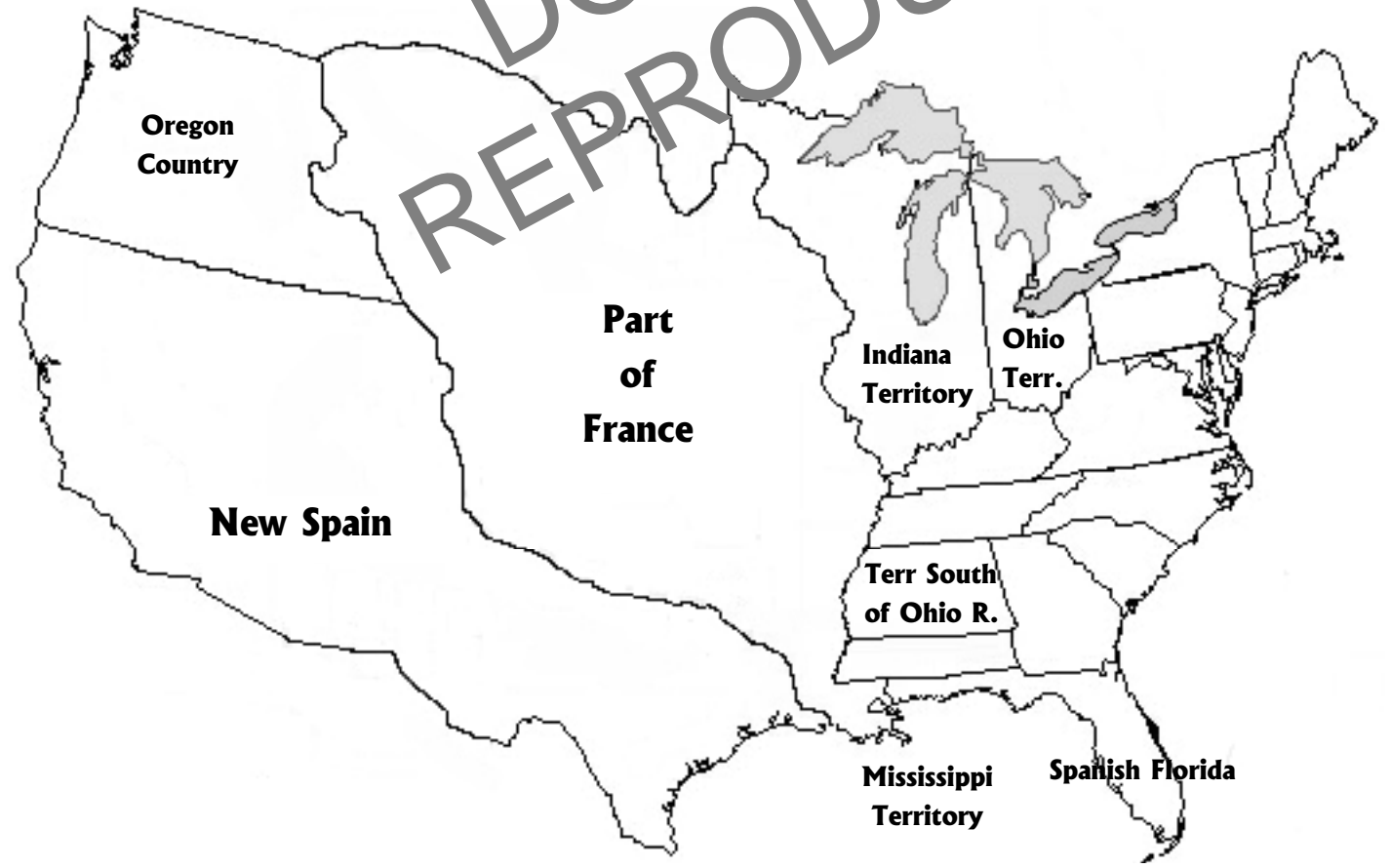
In the election of 1800, no candidate received a majority of the electoral vote. Here are the results including votes cast for the planned vice-presidential candidates.

Candidate	Party	Office	Electoral Vote
Thomas Jefferson	Democratic-Republican	President	73
Aaron Burr	Democratic-Republican	Vice-President	73
John Adams	Federalist	President	65
Charles Pinckney	Federalist	Vice-President	64
John Jay	Federalist		1



- 1) John Adams won the states of Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Vermont, Connecticut, Rhode Island, New Jersey, and Delaware. Lightly shade those states.
- 2) Thomas Jefferson won the remainder of the states excluding Pennsylvania, Maryland, and North Carolina. Darken the states he won.
- 3) Pennsylvania, Maryland, and North Carolina divided their electoral votes between Jefferson and Adams. Leave them white.
